2023 was another year of excitement at Easterseals
Massachusetts! The best way to tell that story is through the stories of those we serve, and we are honored to share some in this Annual Report.

Our mission is very wide in scope and the purpose of our services always comes back to one idea: We are a tool to help people with disabilities meet their goals. Those goals are characteristically diverse as we work with children and adults throughout their lives. That is why our services are as individualized as the people who need them.

The largest endeavor for Easterseals Massachusetts and our clients in 2023 was certainly The Bridge Center. Reviving the campus to provide adaptive horseback riding, Hippotherapy (physical therapy with horses), music, cooking, and so much more, has allowed us to act as hosts for our participants in a way that we previously couldn't. Having a safe environment to push boundaries, learn new skills, and make new friends is something everyone should have equal access to. In many ways, The Bridge Center is a smaller version of the whole organization, and we will continue to innovate and adapt there as we do with all our programming.

In terms of our other programs,

growth continues to be the theme throughout. Our College Navigator Program, which started with only one student five years ago, now serves over 250! College students receiving the tools they need to graduate will help them shoot for higher goals in new careers postgraduation. And speaking of careers, our Employment and Training division has helped more people find, obtain, and most importantly retain employment at higher rates than ever before. Assistive Technology has kept a leadership role in the community, and they continue to expand and adapt services to help clients meet their goals in an everevolving world.

These are only a few of the many ways our dedicated team works to serve our clients with your help. This work is only possible thanks to the support of our community volunteers and donors who believe in what we do.

Unfortunately, once again we are left remembering fierce disability advocates who will not be with us in 2024. Judy Heumann, a leader of the Disability Civil Rights movement who was featured in the documentary Crip Camp, passed away in March. In April, we lost Eli Wolff, an Olympian and international advocate for equality for disabled athletes. To conclude

the year, Joe Tringali, who was well known for his decades of disability advocacy leadership in Western Massachusetts, left us too soon. We also remember our dear friend Rick Hoyt who passed away in May at the young age of 61. Rick and his father Dick, who we lost only two years ago, were pioneers for people with disabilities reaching goals that others said were impossible. This was best demonstrated in his motto, "Yes you can!" Rick and his fellow disability rights leaders will be missed by all of us who knew and admired them, and their legacy will go on through the people they touched and empowered to continue their work.

Thank you for reliving some of the highlights of 2023 with me. Seeing the year through our clients' successes motivates me for the year ahead. I know you will feel the same. As always, I am grateful to have your support as we work together to ensure that children and adults with disabilities have equal opportunities to Live, Learn, Work, and Play!

Allison is a member of the ESMA State Board of Directors who knows the value of our services. She recently achieved one of her most significant goals by publishing her first book, Spirituality Is for Every Body. The book combines her personal experiences with spirituality and disability advocacy. Inspired by her journey and the lack of resources addressing spirituality and disability, Allison's book fills this gap by offering practical guidance and inspiration for others to live more joyful and fulfilling lives. We are grateful that she is donating a portion of her proceeds to ESMA!

Overcoming many barriers, Allison Thompkins is a true example of what perseverance and determination look like. Living with cerebral palsy since birth, she has defied expectations, achieved academic success, and became a leading advocate for accessibility and inclusion. Allison's journey is not just about overcoming physical barriers; it's about embracing spirituality, empowering others, and living life to the fullest.

Allison's introduction to Easterseals Massachusetts (ESMA) and the Assistive Technology (AT) Program came at a pivotal moment in her life. With cerebral palsy, she faces the daily challenges of limited mobility, speech difficulties, and coordination issues. Through ESMAs swimming program and summer camps when she was younger, she discovered a community that embraced her abilities and provided essential support. This early connection laid the foundation for Allison's lifelong partnership with Easterseals, culminating in her access to lifechanging assistive technology. AT has been instrumental in Allison's academic and professional pursuits due to each device opening new opportunities. Among her many successes, Allison holds a doctorate from MIT and has served as an economics consultant to agencies around the world.

In her most recent work with ESMA, Allison worked with Jamie M., a Speech and Language Pathologist and Augmentative Communication Specialist in the MRC Assistive Technology Independent Living (IL)

Program. After an initial evaluation, Jamie determined that Allison's outdated eye gaze device caused immense fatigue that impacted her daily life and independence. ESMA helped Allison obtain a new eye gaze communication device, a communication board, and a switch-adapted phone, so she can communicate when having difficulty speaking and have smoother connectivity to both social media and texting. The communication device also enables Allison to control her environment to aid in daily living with things like turning on a lamp and turning up the heat, all by moving her eyes. Jamie explained that Allison uses word and phrase prediction to increase her speed. "She is the most proficient eye gaze user I have ever seen, she is super focused on her goals, and a lot of fun to work with."

ESMA staff continues to play a crucial role in Allison's journey, providing technological solutions, constant support, and encouragement. From securing adaptive equipment for her education and career to finding innovative solutions for her communication needs, ESMA staff members consistently go above and beyond to empower Allison to achieve her goals with confidence and independence. She said, "Over the years, I've worked with a few AT and IL Easterseals staff members. and the level of dedication, brilliance, and passion exhibited by every staff member is unparalleled and a trademark of Easterseals Massachusetts."

Diagnosed with Central Nervous
System Lupus and other disabilities,
Nicole started losing her vision a few
years ago, significantly impacting her
day-to-day life and making her goal
of earning a college degree more
and more challenging.

Nicole was introduced to the **Easterseals Massachusetts** Assistive Technology (AT) program through her Department of Developmental Services (DDS) case manager. ESMA Assistive Technology Specialist, Victoria C., met with Nicole, identified her needs, and described AT devices that would be useful. Nicole had never heard of many of these devices, and she describes their first meeting as transformative. She became optimistic about regaining her independence and reaching her goal of earning college degrees.

Victoria first identified OrCam MyEye as a solution for reading, object detection, facial recognition, and more. Nicole was able to trial the device by borrowing one from the ESMA Assistive Technology Regional Center and immediately knew this was a perfect solution. In addition to getting this device, other AT provided to Nicole included a laptop with a larger screen and visual impairment features, a larger monitor, an iPad with many accessibility features, and Alexa devices that connected all her technology, helping her stay organized as well as able to communicate with people in other areas of her home.

"The day Victoria brought my new equipment to my home was truly

life-altering," said Nicole. She added, "Victoria was incredible at identifying my needs and what technology was available to help with those needs."

With the help of AT along with dedication and hard work, Nicole reached her goal of graduating with a Paralegal Certificate and an Associate Degree in Legal Studies. Along the way, Nicole's confidence and leadership skills led her to become President of the Delta Alpha Pi and Phi Theta Kappa honor societies, a member of various school clubs, and a recipient of numerous academic rewards. Nicole is passionate about advocating for people with disabilities. She frequently shares her story with others and was a presenter at a DDS Assistive Technology Fair.

Nichole expresses eternal gratitude for Victoria's guidance in teaching her how to use the new AT devices and that she is now able to enjoy much more independence in all areas of her life.

Although Nicole had achieved significant academic success, she dreamed of teaching disability law one day. This new goal would require a bachelor's degree in either criminal justice or legal studies. To accomplish this goal, her DDS case manager thought Nicole would benefit from additional support and referred her to begin working with ESMA's College Navigator program. Her ambition to pursue a career in teaching disability law reflects her commitment to fostering positive change and advocating for people with disabilities.

We are pleased to report that after graduation, Caterina did indeed get a job caring for dogs at a state-of-the-art pet boarding and daycare facility. While putting her heart and excellent customer service skills to use, she enjoys working and playing with dogs individually and in groups to help them have fun and feel safe.

Self-described "animal lover"
Caterina Dubois, a 2023 Holyoke
Community College graduate, said
she needed much more than a
passion for helping animals to
achieve her education goals and
earn her Veterinary Assistant
Certificate. Having autism spectrum
disorder coupled with other
mental health disorders presented
Caterina with problems in planning,
organization, and comprehension
of complex information, especially
the science homework assignments
related to her field of study.

"High school was difficult," recalls
Caterina. "I was misunderstood and
called a rebellious kid who didn't
care about learning. I did not have
confidence or hope that college
could be a positive experience for
me. That all changed when I started
the College Navigator Program and
worked with Rachael at Easterseals.
Suddenly someone really listened
to me, wanted to learn about my
struggles and help me succeed."

Caterina is candid talking about her life and future aspirations. She acknowledges that college classes were hard. "Those days when I felt completely overwhelmed, Rachael was always there for me with encouraging words and practical steps that I could take to reduce my stress and better manage my coursework," comments Caterina. "I would often repeat mantras to myself saying 'I can do this', 'I am going to reach my goal'."

When Caterina heard classmates talking about internships and what

they were learning firsthand at various veterinary hospitals she would feel envious believing that achievement was beyond her ability. Rachael helped Caterina to think differently and coached her on how to prepare and interview for this opportunity. Caterina went on to land an internship at Manchester Veterinary Clinic in Connecticut and credits College Navigator for her "full college experience." Caterina says, "This was huge for me. I didn't think an internship was possible." Caterina applauds the College Navigator program for her hardwon success and for instilling the confidence to pursue her dreams. For Caterina, this means landing a job as a vet technician where she can use her new skills and knowledge, as well as moving into her own apartment.

ESMA College Navigator Rachael P. echoes Caterina's sentiments saying, "It was extremely rewarding to see Caterina find success and a supportive environment at Holyoke Community College. Both her confidence and ability to receive and utilize constructive feedback strengthened throughout the year. Upon graduating from the Veterinary Assistant program, Caterina had a more hopeful outlook on the reality of achieving future goals."

Equipped with her degree, stressbusting mantras, and newfound confidence, Caterina is sure to help many furry friends thrive while living her best life! When Jeremy's mother, Rose, learned about the Physical Therapy (PT) services available at The Bridge Center, she was excited about the possibilities available to him. She was particularly interested in his potential use of Hippotherapy, which uses equine movement during PT sessions. Jeremy, who is nonverbal Autistic, was ready for additional therapy to work on functional goals such as increasing muscle strength, balance, and flexibility. In addition to those goals, other objectives for Jeremy's therapy were to foster positive interaction with others while ensuring a fun and positive experience.

Jeremy's team at The Bridge
Center includes Physical Therapist,
Emma S., volunteers Beth and
Sharon, and horse, Lucky Lionel.
Emma incorporated Hippotherapy
into Jeremy's treatment sessions
to utilize the rhythmic, multidimensional movement pattern
of the horse to help him reach his
goals. This movement plays a pivotal
role in reaching Jeremy's strength
and coordination goals and has the
added impact of improving selfconfidence, executive functioning,
self-regulation, and more.

Every week, Jeremy's family watches his sessions from the Observation Room, witnessing his joyful exploration while participating in various Physical Therapy activities both on and off his horse. Since beginning Hippotherapy, Jeremy has undergone a remarkable transformation in self-confidence.

"I am grateful for Jeremy's wonderful

support team at The Bridge Center,"
Rose said. The team's constant
encouragement and consistent
routines have helped Jeremy make
meaningful gains and growth.
Though initially hesitant about
wearing a helmet and belt, Jeremy
now approaches these tasks with
confidence, understanding their role in
enhancing his enjoyment of activities.
With Hippotherapy, Jeremy continues
to make significant progress toward
his therapy goals while making
additional advancements in improved
safety and independence.

Choosing The Bridge Center has proven to be one of the best decisions Rose has made for Jeremy. She cites the nurturing environment, the warmth and inclusivity of the staff, and the wide range of activities beyond Hippotherapy, such as Recreation and Camp, which collectively cultivate personal growth. Jeremy's journey from initial apprehension to pure enjoyment over the weeks and months of Hippotherapy has reinforced Rose's certainty that The Bridge Center is the perfect fit for his ongoing therapy. Rose added, "The collaboration between Jeremy's team and me has been seamless, ensuring we are all aligned in our aspirations for Jeremy's development."

Jeremy's family and ESMA team all agree that the progress he has made is incredible. As he continues with Therapeutic Services at The Bridge Center, Jeremy remains on a path of growth, steadily meeting his Physical Therapy goals while having fun along the way.

If you ask Sajjona's family what she was meant to do, they reply, "She was born to thrive," and she is doing just that. With their unwavering support and the guidance of Easterseals Massachusetts (ESMA) Rehabilitation Services therapists, she is living, learning, and playing to the fullest.

Sajjona was born with Trisomy 18, also known as Edwards Syndrome. Despite the prognosis that she would not survive more than a few weeks, Sajjona has defied the odds and is now six and a half years old. She is thriving and enjoys activities such as swimming, musical play, and spending quality time with loved ones.

Sajjona works with ESMA Physical Therapist, Tiffany P., on an ongoing basis. Sajjona's mother shared, "Tiffany has such a positive outlook, always focusing on Sajjona's abilities and celebrating her achievements, no matter how small." Tiffany ensures that everything they work on together in their physical therapy (PT) sessions is meaningful and functional. "When I initially began with Sajjona, we started by using the skills she already had and then further developed them, always with meaningful goals in mind."

Since ESMA provides many services directly in the home, Tiffany can consider the household routine and involve family participation in Sajjona's PT sessions. This holistic approach enables Sajjona and her family to learn and practice PT techniques in between scheduled appointments with Tiffany.

Sajjona has reached many goals and has made incredible progress since starting with ESMA in 2022. When Tiffany and Sajjona began working together, Sajjona could sit up without support for only one second. One year later, she could sit on the floor for up to thirty minutes with only intermittent support! Sajjona has developed increased strength and can move in and out of different positions with less support due to the hard work she has put in. Sajjona is now initiating steps with just trunk support, assistance to weight shift, and prompting at the leg, for about 20 feet. With Tiffany's guidance, Sajjona acquired adaptive equipment, including a new stander, gait trainer, car seat, and Rifton Activity Chair. This equipment allows Sajjona to explore her surroundings and participate in different activities independently such as painting and bowling.

In addition to Sajjona's PT services, Sarah V., an ESMA Speech and Language Pathologist, is working with her toward her goals by developing individualized strategies and approaches for improved communication.

Sajjona will continue to thrive and work hard toward achieving her goals while her family, friends, and ESMA therapists will continue celebrating her accomplishments along the way!

Alexander Freeman, an awardwinning filmmaker and disability rights activist with cerebral palsy, navigates life with strong determination despite his physical limitations. His journey intersected with Easterseals Massachusetts as a child through his college years and then again as an adult.

Alex started working with ESMA in the seventh grade through partnerships with the Brookline Public Schools and Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission (MRC). Then, an ESMA AT Specialist created a modified joystick to move with his chin, and a switch to click with his knee to select letters on an on-screen keyboard. This device opened his world to writing poetry, songs, and scripts, eventually leading him to success in directing documentaries and feature films.

In 2022, Alex was referred to ESMA again through the MRC AT Independent Living Program. He wanted to explore other innovative solutions to use his laptop to communicate and work faster as the joystick was no longer keeping up with the pace of his work. He was set up with a Blue2 switch to navigate his iPhone, using his foot and knee to scan and select items quickly. AT Specialist Kathie S. recognized Alex's resourcefulness and success in using his feet to access technology. She researched existing devices in the market and realized that a specialized product needed to be created. She enlisted the support of fellow AT Specialist, Tiffany M., a Biomedical Engineer. Together, with Alex, they began designing a "foot access floor trackpad." The team developed and tested several prototypes and reached a point where

they needed advanced sensors and coding to allow Alex to use swiping motions for accurate and complete control of his computer. This is when they applied to and were accepted into the 2022 Microsoft Hackathon.

Additional AT Specialists, Microsoft Engineers and Programmers, and Alex, collaborated to produce a groundbreaking innovation tailored to Alex's unique needs, with the idea that this device could be modified to help others needing similar accessibility for independent use of technology. "The idea is to give those with disabilities a new way to use the computer without just using their hands," said Alex.

In February 2023, the team was thrilled to present Alex with the first-generation device, aptly named, "The Free-Man." Alex's excitement grew with each prototype iteration and now with an actual floor trackpad to test, his vision for more control of his computer is nearing reality. "I really like how the Easterseals staff took the time to get to know me and my needs and involved me in the development process to create the right technology," added Alex.

The latest version of The Free-Man is currently being refined with the addition of a Wacom drawing tablet and a stylus sewn into a sock. The device allows Alex to utilize his creativity freely without being limited by physical challenges.

Through ESMA's expertise, Microsoft's help, and Alex's positive outlook and resilience, this story is a testament to the transformative power of technology, paving the way toward a more accessible future for all.

## the bridge center

When we signed on to operate
The Bridge Center under the
Easterseals Massachusetts
umbrella, we were excited for this
new chapter in our history. Our
confidence was solidly grounded in
our mission and nearly 80 years of
experience and expertise.

We fired up Team Hoyt's adage "Yes You Can!" - and began work on
our restoration and rebuilding plan
for the 22-acre campus. We knew
reopening programs at The Bridge
Center after a long closure would
require significant elbow grease and
financial investment to ensure the
property was safe for occupancy.

Hundreds of volunteers gave their time and energy to arduous projects, businesses donated thousands of dollars in professional goods and services, and individuals gave generous monetary and in-kind donations. The sum of these efforts multiplied quickly with The Bridge Center obtaining its occupancy permit for two of its buildings. Programming started soon after with the opening of the Equestrian Center for Adaptive Riding and Horsemanship in March, launching Recreation programs during April school vacation, attaining its Physical Therapy facility licensure in April; and receiving an extremely competitive, strategic investment grant of \$250,000 from the Yawkey Foundation in July.

In addition to the overwhelming response to Community Clean Up days, corporate volunteer TeamWork days, community fundraisers, and The Bridge Center Restoring Excellence fundraising campaign, Easterseals Massachusetts was warmly embraced by a community deeply rooted in helping others.

Neighbors from Bridgewater and surrounding communities joined us on campus in October for our first Halloween Trunk-or-Treat celebration. For this event, the property was transformed into a Halloween carnival creating an ideal setting for everyone to have fun and stay safe. It also provided the perfect backdrop to showcase The Bridge Center's completed renovations, introduce our team, volunteers, and herd; and thank residents for their continued support.

In December, The Bridge Center
Restoring 2023 campaign officially
closed raising \$430,988 in
monetary and in-kind donations for
campus renovations and inclusive
programming for all ages and
all abilities. In 2023, through the
generous support of our community,
645 participants and visitors made
progress on personal goals in a
safe and supportive environment;
and our staff, volunteers, and
herd enjoyed personal growth and
fulfillment too.

When ESMA began the work to reopen the campus, we saw endless possibilities and were confident to lead the new beginning. The truth is, as we saw in 2023, the real magic of The Bridge Center is people –

passionate people who want to make a meaningful difference in their community. We are immensely grateful to operate The Bridge Center and grateful for those who share our dream of an inclusive world for people of all abilities.


